Welcome to the special Environment edition of the Ripley Town Council newsletter. We aim to make Ripley a better place. We will try and help all those who need it, by building and strengthening relationships with individuals, groups and communities. Environment Matters in the Ripley Township

The Ripley Neighbourhood Plan (the Plan) has been reviewed and is currently 'out' for a public consultation period which ends on 6th September 2019. There are several reasons why the Plan has been reviewed and a very important one is to strengthen provision for environmental improvements within the rules and regulations that govern the approval of planning applications.

Cllr Freeborn said "Our environment is affected by many things, but how we build new developments is critical. For too long developers have been able to disregard the negative impacts their building programmes might have."

Some of the changes the Town Council is proposing are very simple, others are more complicated. For example, we propose that all surfaces for footways and drives should be permeable. This will greatly reduce the risk of flooding as rainwater will drain into the ground where it falls, rather than having to be carried away by a drainage system.

Ensuring truly sustainable developments through incorporation of electric vehicle charging points, microgeneration of electricity, e.g. through solar panels and of heating systems through ground source heating.



There are many other ideas being proposed in the Plan and, in respect of environmental issues, the Town Council asks you to look at the draft policies E1, E2, E3, E4, E5, E6, E7 and E8.



'The River Starts Here' has been busy helping to look after local brooks. They started by making a little wetland along the brook by Ripley Greenway at Peasehill, so that people can see and enjoy the brook more. It's also good for wildlife. They worked with the Friends of Ripley Greenway and Derbyshire County Council to do this. Thanks everyone!

They have also trained volunteers to record the wildlife in the brooks and have been helping the Friends to pull Himalayan Balsam which is an invasive plant. There will be lots more to do over the year.

There are some welcoming 'Friends' groups in Ripley who help to look after Greenway, Carr Wood and the Hammersmith Meadows. You might think that these groups are just for other people, but anyone can join them, even for just an hour or two. It can be great to get outside and meet new people and know that you've made a difference. It can take your mind off other problems and make you feel better. They can help you if you would be unsure about getting involved for any reason. They want everyone to feel that they can help to look after their brook. Why not give it a try?

Ripley Town Council has just set up a new Environment Committee to co-ordinate and manage activities as we try and improve the quality of our environment. Leader of the Council Steve Freeborn said, "I'm proud that Ripley Town Council seems to be the only Town Council in Derbyshire with an Environmental Policy, together with its associated Action Plan. We are doing our best to improve the environment for everyone's benefit."

The new committee is being chaired by Cllr Weaving who is very keen to get to work in his new role. He said, "I fully understand that some things can be done straight away and they will be! But I recognise that the Town Council is

going to need the help and collaboration of many other organisations and agencies."



Some of the new committee's work will - initially at least – be focussed on delivery of the 3 years long River Starts Here project which is now underway in the township – there is an article about this over the page! But most of the new committee's work will be going into delivering the council's Environmental Action Plan. You can see a copy of this on our website and it describes over 40 separate things the council can and will be doing. We will be reporting our progress – or the barriers to progress – on a regular basis.
