Greenwich Community Sports Hub update

In January 2022, Ripley Town Council became the Custodian Trustees and Management Trustees of Greenwich Community Sports Hub. This now enables Ripley Town Council to fully support Greenwich Park Sports Partnership, Butterley United Cricket Club and Ripley Town Football Club.

Since taking control, we have worked closely with the sports clubs to make significant improvements in the upkeep of the grounds and facilities. In recent weeks, we have added additional storage for the sports clubs so they can easily store their equipment and have it more accessible to them to

We will also be improving the disabled access to the facility by installing a button to open the main entrance door. We are also addressing some of the internal maintenance that has been neglected over recent years.



We are looking to build strong sustainable plans for the Community Sports Hub and protect the facilities for future generations with important input from all local stakeholders.

Ripley Town Council has been urging Amber Valley Borough Council and Derbyshire County Council to get on with the repairs for a long time – ever since the barriers at the various locations were first put up, which were years ago in some cases! Some tree's roots have caused the pavement to lift, and we are pleased that at the time of writing this short report, those problems are actually being repaired.

However, there are still other places with problems in the town, footways are being overgrown by trees that have not been pollarded for a long time, and an old toll-bar gate post on Nottingham Road needs major repairs having been knocked over by a vehicle.
