Looking back at the Queen's Jubilee

The Ripley Township certainly knows how to celebrate! It was great to see so many street parties and gatherings taking place over the Queen's Jubilee Bank Holiday. Unfortunately, it rained on the Sunday which meant that some events had to be cancelled, but in the true British spirit, some people didn't let that spoil it.

Ripley Town Council gave grants to the sum of £2000 shared between ten local groups to organise celebrations for the community to enjoy. Here's what some of them and other families and neighbours got up to.



Welcome to Marehay



We invite you to read on and find out more about the history of this area.

The village of Marehay is located on land which in the 13th century was owned by Ralph de Wyteleg, who was named in a Charter in 1230. Over the centuries this name has evolved to Whiteley.

Mary Hay Parc was granted to the Zouch family of Codnor Castle in 1542 after the dissolution of the monasteries by Henry VIII. Marehay Hall is situated close to Street Lane.

Brook Lane was named after Johnny's Brook which was probably named after the church and school on Derby Road. The brook crosses Derby Road near to Bowler Street and eventually flows into the Coppice Brook.

St John's Church started life as a corrugated sheet construction in 1871.

The foundation stones of the brick church were laid in 1873. St John's Church closed in 1987 and it was sold to the Pentecostal Church, who renamed it as The Springs of Living Water in 1990.

The Saint John's Church of England Primary School was built by the Butterley Company and opened in 1865. Many will remember the Head Teacher Mr Shipman and the former Mayor of Ripley Mr Emmas-Williams as teacher. The school closed in 1970 and a new school was built on Danmah Street in Ripley.

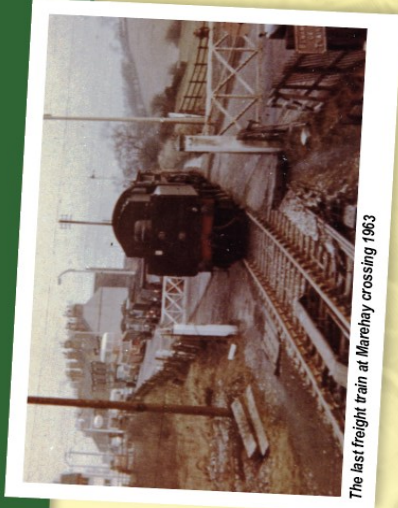
Brook Lane and Warmwells Lane was the main road between Derby and Ripley until the A61 was built. There is still a toll bar pillar at Weston Spot. This area of green was originally a pinfold for wandering livestock.



Whiteley is one of the oldest named areas in the whole of Ripley.

Marehay Miners' Welfare was built on the site of Whiteley Colliery which was started around 1835 and closed in 1936. There were many small coal mines in the area, including Ford's Pit that was used for pumping water out of adjoining mines until just after the Second World War. Ford's Pit was close to the Cricket Ground and there are still some remains near the path from Weston Spot to Marehay "City", as the terraced miners' housing in the area was known.

Marehay Colliery started around 1860 and was sold to Butterley Company in 1860. It was opposite the site of the Miners Arms, now known as the Village Inn.

The railway line from Little Eaton reached Marehay in 1856, crossing the road at what is now Marehay Garage. The line was used by the Marehay collieries as it went to a turntable and station on Peasehill Road. With the need for passenger traffic from Ripley Town Centre, the line was extended in 1890 to Ripley Station on Nottingham Road. Marehay crossing was closed in 1963 and the line converted into a footpath, known as Ripley Greenway.

Marehay's best known son was footballer Alfred Strange, born on 2 April 1900. After leaving school he worked at Whiteley Colliery. His early soccer was played with Peasehill Rovers, Codnor Rangers and Marehay Colliery as a free-scoring centre-forward.

He made his international debut before 87,375 people at Wembley against Scotland on 5 April 1930. He died suddenly aged 78, on 3 October 1978.

The Butterley Company was significant in the Industrial Revolution. We want to establish a Heritage Centre so that the people of Ripley Township and the surrounding area can understand the history of Butterley and how it influenced the development of the towns around Ripley.

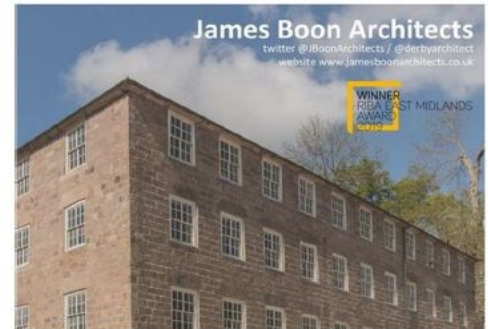
To do this we need a business plan for a Heritage Centre; so, we have put together a project to develop this. We would like to use one of the existing buildings on the Butterley Ironworks site, but we would need to get it back "in shape." Another thing we must think about is what are we going to show people? We need to prove it will be interesting enough to draw lots of Visitors & therefore be sustainable.

We have been granted funding from the National Heritage Lottery Fund, the Ripley Town Council and raised funding from our own Crowdfunding appeal.

The Butterley Ironworks Trust have selected key partners to help us: -

Focus Consultants to work on a Business Plan

James Boon Architects to investigate the restoration of an original building which could house a Heritage Centre.



Imagemakers to help us tell the story of the Butterley Company & how the Industrial society developed.

But we need you!

There will be opportunities for engagement for the people of Ripley Township with the Butterley Ironworks Trust & partners to see the suggestions and ideas. These activities will give you plenty of ways to give us your feedback.

We aim, in approximately 4 months from now, to have a well-developed proposal with your backing with which we aim to obtain further funding to enable the First Stage of making it happen.
