

Community Matters

Town Centre office closure for Ripley Police team

In January 2023, Ripley Town Council received the following statement from Derbyshire Constabulary Command Team regarding the closure of the Police's town centre office, which is situated in the old Town Hall building on Ripley Market Place:

'Officers from the Ripley Safer Neighbourhood Team (SNT) will remain working from Ripley Police Station, Wyatts Way, as they have done for the last year, following their relocation from the Town Hall during essential building work. Whilst those building works are now complete, the infrastructure that is available to the team at Ripley Police Station which supports the delivery of services, means it is now the most effective and economical base from which to operate. There will be no impact on the police services provided by the team caused by this decision, and they remain only a short distance from the town centre. They can be contacted for non emergency matters on 101'.

Councillor Steve Freeborn said, 'This is an unfortunate situation and as a council we are concerned about this closure. The purpose of the SNT is to be in the heart of the community and town centre. It takes too long for them to respond to incidents in the town, if they are not based there.'

Ripley Town Council have written to the Chief Constable and Police and Crime Commissioner to ask they reconsider this decision. We will update you in the next newsletter if we receive a response.

RIPLEY TOWN COUNCIL BUDGET 2023/2024

We are pleased to report that there will be a <u>0% increase</u> in the Ripley Town Council aspect of the Council Tax for the financial period, April 2023 to March 2024. This is due to the careful management of our finances and our acknowledgement of the current cost of living crisis.

We will maintain our current services including grants for local groups, free community events, youth provision, wonderful Christmas lights and floral displays throughout the Ripley Township.

Warm Wednesdays

Back in November 2022, Ripley Town Council responded to the Cost of Living Crisis by introducing 'Warm Wednesdays' at Greenwich Community Sports Hub on Nottingham Road, Ripley.

We encourage members of our community who may be struggling with the cost of heating their home during the day, to come along and share a warm space with other in similar situations.

We offer free hot drinks and a free hot lunch each week.

These sessions have been attended by over 40 people on Wednesdays who come along to meet new friends, play cards, do crafts or bring their own hobbies along to do.

Warm Wednesdays are running until 29th March 2023, 10am until 4pm. Just turn up!



Community Matters

Changes to voting in May elections

On **Thursday 4th May 2023**, local elections are taking place in Amber Valley and across a further 229 councils in England.

At these elections, you will need to bring photo ID to be able to vote at a polling station. A wide range of photo ID will be accepted, including passports, driving licences and cards with a PASS Mark (proof of age).

If you don't have an accepted form of photo ID, you can apply for a free voter ID document known as a Voter Authority Certificate.

There are other ways to vote

Postal Voting - you don't need to provide photo ID to vote by post.

You must be registered to vote before you can apply for a postal vote. If you are not sure if you have already registered, please contact Amber Valley Borough Council on 01773 841458 or email elections@ambervalley.gov.uk

If you are not registered, please visit www.gov.uk/register-to-vote.

You will need to ensure your postal vote application is completed by **5pm on Tuesday 18th April 2023.**

You will receive your ballot paper in the post. Complete and return your ballot paper, ensuring you leave enough time for it to arrive at Amber Valley Borough Council by **10pm on Thursday 4th May 2023**. If you can't post your postal vote back in time, you can take it to your polling station on polling day.



We hope you will vote in the local elections on 4th May 2023 and we encourage you to use a postal vote to do so.

Councillor Janis Gregory 1942-2023



Councillors and staff at Ripley Town Council are saddened to report the recent death of Councillor Janis Gregory.

Councillor Gregory was first elected to the Town Council in 1986, representing the Elms Ward, which she did up until her passing.

She was retired, but before this worked for over 25 years for the Careers Service (Connexions) in a variety of jobs.

Janis chaired the Ripley Branch of the Labour Party and was Secretary of the Amber Valley Constituency Labour Party. Over the years, she was a Governor at various schools in Ripley.

She was a keen knitter and has contributed immensely to the wool bombing displays in Ripley over the years.

Our thoughts are with her family at this difficult time.

Her funeral will take place on Tuesday 14th February 2023 at 1pm at Amber Valley Crematorium, Derby Road, Swanwick DE55 1BH. Janis's wish is that you need not wear black. Family flowers only.
